Message from our Supreme Past President

In this Covid world and the restrictions in our areas, many of us are out of touch with our family, friends and Columbiette Sisters. We may be experiencing feelings of isolation and depression due to the lack of contact with others. Even when we get together, there are masks and distance between. How do we overcome the feeling of separation? How do we retain our Team Members?

The key to retaining your membership is providing an environment in which members are engaged. In 2009, a report by MacLeod and Clark revealed that engaged team members are 87% less likely to leave the organization. We have to find creative ways to keep in touch with our membership. Of course, the best way is through in person meetings and events but when restrictions are in place, we have the options of virtual meetings. For a Leader to keep her team members engaged it is suggested that you develop good relationships. You can do this through the following method.

- 1. Responsibility-Individuals want opportunities to develop so give them responsibilities that allow them to grow and gain new skills. Provide training and materials for their use. Give more challenges to those that have earned it.
- Respect People need to feel appreciated and respected so that they can fully engage in their duties. This includes offering everyone the opportunity to participate in all activities. Communicate and consult with your Team

- Members so that they feel that they have a voice in the organization. Leaders who respect their members can develop strong, productive and loyal relationships with them.
- 3. Revenue Sharing Compensation and benefits are an important contributor to how satisfied your Team Members feel. Engaging the Knights Council can help with a group's performance and can motivate both groups to make a more personal investment in achieving the organizations goals fund raising.
- 4. Reward Recognition for a job well done is important and can mean the difference in someone doing more or less for the group. Where appropriate, recognize individuals in front of your members, host appreciation events, give service awards, write personal thank you notes. If you do things that let your Team know that you appreciate them, you can boost morale and increase productivity.
- Relaxation Time -5. Everyone needs to relax and recharge, so provide appropriate time after business for socialization and bonding. Looking forward to together time can increase your **Team Members** happiness and wellbeing.

Retain your members by creating an open and honest culture where they're comfortable enough to share how they feel. Here are a few ways to promote this kind of environment.

- **Providing Mentoring** Opportunities – Give your Team Members the opportunity to learn something new or pass on their own expertise. This can help build relationships, grow confidence and learn more about the organization.
- Offer Shadowing -Encourage your Team Members to take an interest in other duties of the organization by shadowing sessions. Work with a book officer or Committee Chair, this may inspire them to consider a different position in the organization.
- Encourage Members to Give and Receive Honest Feedback -Provide your Team with regular sessions so they can voice opinions on things that matter to them and others in the organization.

Remember that everyone is different and that what engages or retains one Team Member may not necessarily work for another. Get to know your members, work with their strengths, be flexible in your approach. Be aware that their wants and needs may change over time so be open minded to new ideas and directions and regularly review your methods of engagement. Remember, You Got This!

Saint Josephine Margaret Bakhita was born around 1869 in the village of Olgossa in the Darfur region of Sudan. She was a member of the Daju people, and her uncle was a tribal chief. Due to her family lineage, she grew up happy and relatively prosperous, saying that as a child, she did not know suffering.

Historians believe that sometime in February 1877, Josephine was kidnapped by Arab slave traders. Although she was just a child, she was forced to walk barefoot over 600 miles to a slave market in El Obeid. She was bought and sold at least twice during the grueling journey.

For the next 12 years she would be bought, sold and given away over a dozen times. She spent so much time in captivity that she forgot her original name

Her experiences, as a slave varied from fair treatment to cruel. Her first owner, a wealthy Arab, gave her to his daughters as a maid. The assignment was easy until she offended her owner's son, possibly for the crime of breaking a vase. As punishment, she was beaten so severely she was incapacitated for a month. After that, she was sold. One of her owners was a Turkish general who gave her to his wife and mother-in-law who both beat her daily. Josephine wrote that as soon as one wound would heal; they would inflict

She told about how the general's wife ordered her to be scarred. As her mistress watched, ready with a whip, another woman drew patterns on her skin with flour, then cut into her flesh with a blade. She rubbed the wounds with salt to make the scars permanent. She would suffer a total of 114 scars from this abuse.

In 1883, the Turkish general sold her to the Italian Vice Consul, Callisto Legani. He

was a much kinder master, and he did not beat her. When it was time for him to return to Italy, she begged to be taken with him, and he agreed. After a long and dangerous journey across Sudan, the Red Sea, and the Mediterranean, they arrived in Italy. She was given away to another family as a gift and she served them as a nanny.

Her new family also had dealings in Sudan. Her mistress decided to travel to Sudan without Josephine, she placed her in the custody of the Canossian Sisters in Venice.

While she was in the custody of the sisters, she came to learn about God. According to Josephine, she had always known about God, who created all things, but she did not know who He was. The sisters answered her questions. She was deeply moved by her time with the sisters and discerned a call to follow Christ.

When her mistress returned from Sudan, Josephine refused to leave. Her mistress spent three days trying to persuade her to leave the sisters, but Josephine remained steadfast. This caused the superior of the institute for baptismal candidates among the sisters to complain to Italian authorities on Josephine's behalf.

The case went to court, and the court found that slavery had been outlawed in Sudan before Josephine was born, so she could not be lawfully made slave. She was declared free.

For the first time in her life, Josephine was free and could choose what to do with her life. She chose to remain with the Canossian Sisters.

She was baptized on January 9, 1890 and took the name Josephine Margaret and Fortunata. (Fortunata is the

Latin translation for her Arabic name, Bakhita). She also received the sacraments of her first holy communion and confirmation on the same day. These three sacraments are the sacraments of initiation into the Church and were always given together in the early Church. The Archbishop who gave her the sacraments was none other than Giusseppe Sarto, the Cardinal Patriarch of Venice, who would later become Pope Pius X.

Josephine became a novice with the Canossian Daughters of Charity religious order on December 7, 1893 and took her final vows on December 8, 1896. She was eventually assigned to a convent in Schio, Vicenza.

For the next 42 years of her life, she worked as a cook and a doorkeeper at the convent. She also traveled and visited other convents telling her story to other sisters and preparing them for work in Africa.

She was known for her gentle voice and smile. She was gentle and charismatic and was often referred to lovingly as the "little brown sister" or honorably as the "black mother."

When speaking of her enslavement, she often professed she would thank her kidnappers. For had she not been kidnapped, she might never have come to know Jesus Christ and entered His Church.

During World War II, the people of the village of Schio regarded her as their protector. And although bombs fell on their village, not one citizen died.

In her later years, she began to suffer physical pain and was forced to use a wheelchair. But she always remained cheerful. If anyone asked her how she was, she would reply, "As the master desires."

On the evening of February 8, 1947, Josephine spoke her last words, "Our Lady, Our Lady!" She then died. Her body lay on display for three days afterwards.



The Official Prayers of the Columbiettes

The Official Columbiette prayers with proper wording are listed below. The opening and closing prayers are to be recited before and after all business meetings, special meetings, Initiation Ceremonies, and Installation of Officers Ceremonies. Recitation of the prayers begin and end with the Sign of the Cross. At each petition, the presiding officer states the salutation and the assembly states the petition. For example: the presiding officer says, "St. Joan of Arc" and the assembly says, "pray for us, the born and the unborn."

THE OPENING PRAYER

Blessed Virgin Mary, our Patroness, we beseech you to intercede in our behalf in obtaining the grace that we might be ever mindful of our responsibilities to Holy Mother Church and also in obtaining for us the spiritual as well as temporal favors which will enable the Columbiettes to grow and prosper.

St. Joan of Arc, pray for us, the born and the unborn. St. Therese, the Little Flower, pray for us.

THE CLOSING PRAYER

O God, from whom are holy desires, right counsels and just works, give Your servants that peace which the world cannot give; that our hearts may be disposed to obey Your commandments, and the fear of our enemies being removed, our times, by Your protection, may be peaceful.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, world without end. Amen.

Immaculate Heart of Mary, obtain peace for the world.

All Prayer Cards, printed copies and video slides are be worded as above. The Supreme Council has not approved any word changes to our Official Prayers.

LET'S LEARN

Money received by the Chair of a fundraiser or any other function which includes receiving money is **not** to be deposited in anyone's personal bank account with the intention of transferring the money to the Financial Secretary. All money due the Auxiliary, Chapter or State is to be turned over directly to the Financial

Did you know . . .

The Financial Secretary's duty is to collect and receive all moneys due the Auxiliary, Chapter or State. The Financial Secretary, within ten (10) business days of receiving the funds, turns over the money to the Treasurer. This includes all

funds received for fines, dues, contributions, initiation fees and money from any other source. The Treasurer gives the Financial Secretary a written receipt for the money turned over to her. All receipts are to be held and filed for audit.



The Treasurer is to deposit money received by the Financial Secretary to the credit of the Auxiliary, Chapter or State in an approved bank or other secure institution of deposit where the organization holds an account. The deposit must be made within ten (10) business days of receiving the funds.

This provides a check and balance system to protect the funds of the Auxiliary, Chapter and State.

Friendly Reminders:

- When sending a payment to the Supreme Financial Secretary for items purchased, please enclose the invoice with your check so your account can be credited correctly.
- If you have elected new Officers, Delegates and/or Alternates during the year, you must notify the Supreme Secretary, your State Secretary and your Chapter Financial Secretary.
- Per our By-laws, the Financial Secretary has ten (10) business days to turn money over to the Treasurer. The Treasurer has ten (10) business days to deposit the funds in the bank.
- Member information reported on the A-100 form is to be sent to the **Supreme** Secretary.
- When sending in A-100 forms and a fee is due, make sure the form is filled out legibly and enclose a check made payable to Supreme Council Columbiettes.
- Information about Auxiliaries should be kept current on the Supreme website. Check to make sure contact information, Officer names, and dates with times of meetings are correct.
- Remember two signatures are required when issuing a check.
- Invoices received from the Supreme Council or your State Council do not require a vote to be paid. They are to be paid immediately to avoid late charges.
- The Immediate Past President is the Chair of both the Audit and Nominating Committee.

The power of faith - may we all feel it now and always!




GET COOKING WORD SEARCH

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Holy Week is the week before Easter Sunday, beginning seven days before with Palm Sunday. It ends with Holy Saturday. Easter Sunday is not part of Holy Week, but rather the beginning of the Easter season of the Liturgical year.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday. On this day, we celebrate the triumphant entry of Our Lord, Jesus Christ, into Jerusalem, riding a donkey. On that day, the people laid palms before Him, a gesture reserved for triumphant leaders. We celebrate this at Mass by distributing palms to the faithful who may keep them for a time for use as devotional objects. The palms are blessed at Mass. The faithful sometimes craft portions of palm fronds into crosses. Eventually, these palms are returned to the Church where they are burned. Traditionally, their ashes are saved and distributed at next year's Ash Wednesday services.



Later, when Jesus entered the Temple, he angrily drove out the money changers who had turned the Temple court into a place of business instead of devotion. Once the court was cleared, Jesus began teaching the masses. Meanwhile, His enemies drew plans to kill Him. The next major event in Holy Week is Holy Thursday. On this day, Jesus celebrated the Passover feast with the disciples. We know this feast as the Last Supper. This is the night He was betrayed by Judas and arrested.

The Last Supper is celebrated at every Mass, and especially on Holy Thursday. After supper, Jesus went to the Mount of Olives and prayed. From this event comes inspiration for our practice of Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration, where we are invited to spend one hour in prayer with Jesus, truly present in the Eucharist; Body, Blood, and Divinity. Jesus was arrested on the night of Holy Thursday.

The next day is Good Friday, and on this day, we commemorate the trial, punishment, and crucifixion of Our Lord.

On that morning, Jesus was brought before Annas, a powerful Jewish cleric who condemned Jesus for blasphemy. From there, Jesus was presented to Pilate for trial. Although Pilate found no guilt in Jesus, he agreed to have him crucified to appease the crowd of people and prevent a riot.

Christ was stripped, flogged, and crowned with thorns. He was then forced to carry His Cross to the place of His execution. There, He was nailed to the Cross between two thieves who were likewise crucified. Late that afternoon, seeking to ensure Christ's death, a Roman guard stabbed him in his side with a spear. When Jesus died, an earthquake is said to have occurred as well as a great darkness which covered the land. Suddenly, many people knew Jesus was the Son of God.

Jesus was taken and laid quickly in a borrowed tomb, in accord with Jewish law, which required the dead be buried by sundown before the Sabbath.

In our churches, the Tabernacle is left empty, to show that Christ is departed. On Holy Saturday, there is no Mass. Parishes may hold services, but there is no distribution of Communion.

On Holy Saturday, we remember that Jesus was descended into hell where He preached the Gospel to those who died before and opened the way to heaven for all those who were worthy.

This concludes Holy Week. The following day is Easter Sunday, the day on which it was discovered the Tomb was empty, and our Lord was resurrected, triumphing over death once and for all time.

Mass of the Oils Chrism Mass

The **Chrism Mass** is a religious service held in Roman Catholicism, Lutheranism, and Anglicanism. [1][2]

Holy Thursday is notable for being the day on which the Chrism Mass is celebrated in each diocese. The Chrism Mass is one of the most solemn and important liturgies of the liturgical year. Usually held in the diocesan cathedral, it is generally held on the morning of Holy Thursday, but may in some dioceses take place on another day during Holy Week. It is often the largest annual gathering of clergy and faithful held in most dioceses. In some dioceses, attendance is sufficiently significant that, due to limited seating, tickets are distributed to parishes. The Mass is a celebration of the institution of the priesthood with Jesus' words at the Last Supper, "Do this in memory of me." During the Mass, those present are called to renew their baptismal promises; priests/ministers and deacons also reaffirm their ministry by renewing the promises made at their ordination.

The Mass takes its name from the blessing of the <u>holy oils</u> used in the sacraments throughout the year, which are then given to priests/ministers to take back to their parishes. The Rite of Reception of the Oils by representatives of the diocesan parishes is a sign of each parish's unity with the Bishop and the diocesan Church. Whenever the holy oils are used, the ministry of the bishop who consecrated them is symbolically present. The oils distributed are meant to last all year, although extra oil is also blessed during the Mass and is kept at the cathedral as a reserve if a parish runs out.

The service is a 1967 restoration of the rite recorded in the early 200s by the historian <u>Hippolytus</u> who writes of a ceremony taking place during the <u>Easter Vigil</u> at which two holy oils were blessed and one was consecrated. In the fifth century, the ceremony of the oils was transferred from the Easter Vigil to Holy Thursday during a special Mass for that purpose, distinct from the Mass of the Lord's Supper. The change took place, partly, because of the large crowds that assembled for the Easter Vigil, but also to emphasize Christ's institution of this ordained priesthood at Holy Thursday's Last Supper. In the decree renewing this rite <u>Pope Paul VI</u> said: "The Chrism Mass is one of the principal expressions of the fullness of the bishop's priesthood and signifies the closeness of the priests with him." [12]

The Holy Oils are:

- <u>Chrism</u> used in the sacraments of <u>Baptism</u>, <u>Confirmation</u> and <u>Holy Orders</u>, as well as for the consecration of altars and the dedication of churches. [13]
- the oil of catechumens also used in the sacrament of Baptism, and
- the oil of the sick used in the rite of the Anointing of the Sick

Blessing Chrism

The oil of the catechumens and chrism are used on the upcoming <u>Holy Saturday</u> at the <u>Easter Vigil</u>, for the <u>baptism</u> and <u>confirmation</u> of those entering the church.

While the Oil of the Catechumens and the Oil of the Sick, are simply "blessed," the Sacred Chrism is "consecrated,". Holy chrism is a mixture of olive oil and balsam, an aromatic resin. Balsam is poured into the oil, which gives it a sweet smell intended to remind those who encounter it of the "odor of sanctity" to which those who are marked with it, are called to strive. The bishop breathes over the vessel containing the chrism, a gesture which symbolizes the Holy Spirit coming down to consecrate this oil, and recalls the actions of Jesus in John 20:22, when he breathed on the apostles and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit..." The priests concelebrating the Mass extend their hands toward the vessel containing the chrism and say the prayer of consecration silently as the bishop pronounces it over the chrism.[4][12]

Easter, also called Pascha or Resurrection Sunday, is a festival and holiday commemorating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, described in the New Testament as having occurred on the third day after his burial following his crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary c. 30 AD. It is the culmination of the Passion of Jesus, preceded by Lent, a 40-day period of fasting, prayer, Observances: Prayer, all-night vigil, sunrise service

<u>Celebrations:</u> Church services, festive family meals, Easter egg decoration,

and gift-giving

Significance: Celebrates the resurrection of Jesus

When Is Easter? Easter 2021 occurs on Sunday, April 4. However, Easter falls on a different date each year.

Easter Sunday and related celebrations, such as Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday, are considered "moveable feasts," although, in western Christianity, which follows the Gregorian calendar, Easter always falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25. Easter typically falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon occurring on or after the spring equinox.

In some households, a character known as the Easter Bunny delivers candy and chocolate eggs to children on Easter Sunday morning. These candies often arrive in an Easter basket.

The exact origins of the Easter Bunny tradition are unknown, although some historians believe it arrived in America with German immigrants in the 1700s. Notably, several Protestant Christian denominations have opted to formally abandon many Easter traditions, deeming them too pagan. However, many religious observers of Easter also include them in their celebrations.

Easter foods are steeped in symbolism. An Easter dinner of lamb also has historical roots, since a lamb was often used as a sacrificial animal in Jewish traditions, and lamb is frequently served during Passover. The phrase "lamb of God" is sometimes used to refer to Jesus and the sacrificial nature of his death.
